# **ADVOCACY UPDATE**





#### HARRISBURG OVERVIEW

The 2023-24 session will officially conclude on November 30th, leaving limited session days to move outstanding bills through the legislative process and across the Governor's desk. If they don't make it through the finish line, the bills will have to be reintroduced for consideration during the next session.

This fall, the House plans to gavel-in for 11 session days and the Senate for 14 days.

#### House of Representatives

The House continues to operate with slim margins between Democrats and Republicans. Without a clear majority, it's difficult for either caucus to successfully pass controversial bills through the chamber.

At full complement, the House has 203
Representatives. Right now, there are 201 members.
Two Democrats recently resigned, bringing their numbers down from 102 to 100 seats. Republicans are technically in the majority with 101 seats. The special election to fill those two seats is scheduled for September 17th and it is generally expected that both seats will be filled by Democrats, putting them back in the majority (102) for the remainder of the session.

#### Senate

Senate Republicans continue to hold the majority with 28 seats; Democrats hold 22 seats.

#### 2024 Elections

On November 5th, all 203 seats of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives and 25 out of the 50 Senators are up for election. All odd-numbered Senate district seats are up for election this year.

On your ballots, you'll also find three state row offices: Attorney General, Auditor General and Treasurer. The major party candidates for each office are as follows:

- Attorney General

  - Democrat Eugene DePasquale
- Auditor General
  - Incumbent Republican Tim DeFoor
  - Democrat Malcolm Kenyatta

#### **BUDGET LINE ITEM**

Each year, our priorities for the Bleeding Disorders Foundation are to protect the hemophilia line item in the state budget and ensure that the funding distribution formula remains as is.

This year, we were able to secure \$1,017,000 in the General Appropriations bill (SB 1001) and protect the distribution formula with language in the fiscal code (HB 2310), as follows.

#### **LEGISLATION**

#### **Pharmacy Benefit Managers (PBM) Reform**

Representative Jessica Benham (D-Allegheny) and Representative Valerie Gaydos (R-Allegheny) cosponsored HB 1993, which amends the Pharmacy Audit Integrity and Transparency Act. In short, the bill provides the state with more oversight over PBMs and limits or bans several practices by PBMs, including patient steering, spread pricing and retroactive recoupment of money paid by the PBM to the pharmacy.

More specifically, it prohibits PBMs from:

- Reimbursing a retail pharmacy less than the amount that the PBM reimburses a PBM-affiliated pharmacy;
- Unilaterally altering the terms of the original contract;
- Designating a prescription drug as a specialty drug or requiring a prescription drug to be dispensed exclusively at a specialty pharmacy.
- In addition, health insurers and their contracted PBMs are prohibited from:
- Requiring covered individuals to purchase prescription drugs exclusively through a mail-order pharmacy or PBM-affiliated retail pharmacy.
- Prohibiting or limiting a covered individual from selecting an in-network pharmacy of the individual's choice.

After several rounds of amendments, the bill passed the House with a vote of 172-30, the Senate with a vote of 48-1 and was signed by the Governor as **Act 77 of 2024**.

#### **Telemedicine**

For nearly a decade, legislators have been attempting to address and expand access to telemedicine. This session, Senator Elder Vogel (R-Beaver) can say he accomplished it.

SB 739 was signed into law as **Act 42 of 2024**. The law requires health insurance companies to pay or reimburse participating network providers for covered health care services that were delivered via telemedicine, per the terms and conditions of the contract.

Note that the law doesn't specifically address payment parity, but rather leaves the details open-ended for individual contracts, likely in an intentional move to keep insurers neutral on the bill.

Act 42 will take effect on October 1st, 2024.

#### **Access to Menstrual Hygiene Products**

Representative Darisha Parker (D-Philadelphia) sponsored HB 851, which amends the Public School Code by creating a grant program to provide eligible public-school entities with funding to acquire and

distribute menstrual hygiene products at no expense to students. The bill appropriates \$3 million to the Department of Education for the grant program.

The bill recently passed the House with a vote of 117-85. It was sent to the Senate.

Somewhat simultaneously, Governor Shapiro suggested similar funding in his budget proposal. His proposal was included in the final budget package.

The Bleeding Disorders Foundation was instrumental in the success of this initiative. We shared letters of support for this with the Governor's office as well as the House and Senate Appropriations Committees. Congrats team!

## Prohibiting Health Insurers from Altering Coverage or Premiums

In March, Representative Joe Hogan (R-Bucks) circulated a co-sponsorship memo indicating his intent to introduce legislation re: non-medical switching. His legislation would amend the Unfair Insurance Practices Act to prohibit health insurers from altering the coverage or premiums included in an insured person's health insurance policy during the policy term when an insured person has already received a specific treatment, service or prescription drug. We anticipate bill introduction soon.

Please continue to share your experiences with the BDF team so we can help advance this bill.

#### **Co-Pay Accumulator**

Senator Judy Ward's SB 372 amends the Insurance Company Law of 1921 by requiring insurers or pharmacy benefit managers to count any amounts paid, by the enrollee or paid on behalf of the enrollee by another party, towards the deductible or out-of-pocket limit. SB 372 is waiting for consideration by the Senate Banking and Insurance Committee.

In January, Representative Bridget Kosierowski (D-Lackawanna) indicated her intent to introduce companion bill in the House and circulated a cosponsorship memo.

The Milliron Goodman team is continuing to stay engaged on this issue. Please continue to share your personal experiences with co-pay accumulators with the BDF team.

#### **Copay Accumulator Adjuster Programs Clearing Up the Misconceptions**

Copay Accumulator Adjustment Programs are affecting a tremendous number of patients with a diverse set of health conditions - most affected are those with chronic and/or rare disorders.

- Allowing Health Plans to utilize Copay Accumulator Adjuster programs leaves a lot of patients vulnerable and unable to access their medication. Patients are choosing between paying their rent/mortgage, putting food on the table, or paying for their medication.
- Bleeding Disorder patients meet their OOP maximum the first month or two of the year. They depend on Copay Assistance Programs to help them meet their deductible.
- Currently, over 63% of marketplace plans in Pennsylvania have copay accumulator adjustment policies. 1

# Community Spirit

One of the greatest needs in the hemophilia community today is to motivate the younger generation to get involved in advocating for the issues that impact our community and "Pay it Forward". We are so fortunate today to have safe hemophilia treatments. Even with my diagnosis of severe Hemophilia A, I can say that I am living my life to the fullest as a 3-sport high school athlete (baseball, soccer and basketball) and being able to complete my Eagle Scout Rank.

In the 1980's, most young men with severe hemophilia died from AIDS due to medications affected by the tainted blood supply. In 2005, when I was born, a person with severe hemophilia could live a normal life. At that time, it was reassuring to learn that there were great strides being made in genetic research and improved treatments. As I got older, I was inspired to be a part of driving forward these exciting initiatives in the bleeding disorders community.

My journey to "Pay it Forward" started at the age of 5 years old when I began attending the annual National Bleeding Disorders Foundation's (NBDF) Washington D.C. Advocacy Day with my mother. At that time, we had learned that there were no families visiting the Delaware lawmakers in D.C., so we decided to take on that role. Although we lived in PA, we were so close to Delaware that we went the HTC at Christiana until I was 7. Over the next 14 years I would annually meet with the senators and congressmen of Delaware in Washington D.C. to discuss issues that impacted the bleeding disorders community like ensuring access to our specialty medications and addressing

insurance company tactics that can threaten that access (i.e. copay accumulators). As I developed these relationships, my confidence increased I was able to be more effective in encouraging them to co-sponsor legislation (like the HELP Copays Act of 2023 and the Skilled Nursing Facility act of 2019) and continue to support funding for the federal hemophilia programs. Through this experience I have developed skills in speaking persuasively and learned to build an effective argument for my 'ask' backed by data, reason, and compelling examples. By working with the National Bleeding Disorders Foundation on these advocacy initiatives I was able to broaden my knowledge of the issues impacting this community beyond my personal experiences. I have benefited from the medical progress and strong advocacy that resulted from the crisis in the 80's and I want to 'pay it forward' to further benefit the hemophilia community.

I have been able to take the learnings from my federal advocacy and apply it at the state and local level. One example of this is when I shared my testimony at Pennsylvania State legislative hearing about the high cost of specialty prescription drugs. Additionally, I worked with the Governor's Office in Delaware to have March designated as Bleeding Disorders Awareness Month. Another example was the 'Genetics of Hemophilia' presentation I did at my school. For 4 years I was able to do this presentation for the entire 7th grade class in my school as a part of the science curriculum regarding x-linked disorders. The presentation provided an education of what hemophilia is, how it is treated, how it is genetically

passed as an x-linked chromosome and the example of how it was passed within my family.

In 2023 I was a Junior Camp Counselor at the Hole in the Wall Gang Camp created by Paul Newman. Throughout my childhood I had the opportunity to attend this special summer 'sleep away' camp for kids with chronic health conditions. The affirming and supportive atmosphere created a 'camp magic' that enabled campers to step outside of their comfort zone and have fun engaging in activities they may not normally try, like self-infusing. It was rewarding for me to take the journey full circle from experiencing the 'camp magic' as a camper to creating the 'camp magic' and bringing that same joy to the new campers as a Junior Camp Counselor.

My cousin, who also has severe hemophilia, and I started a walk team together called Cousins for a Cure to raise money for hemophilia research. Over ten years we raised over \$130,000. The funds were used to make donations to bleeding disorders research programs, various hemophilia camps in the area, hemophilia treatments centers in Pennsylvania and Delaware and to families experiencing financial crisis

due to their bleeding disorder. We were recognized as the top fundraising team at the Eastern PA Chapter Walk from 2010 to 2017.

I was honored to receive the Outstanding Advocacy Award (2014) from the Eastern PA Chapter, Ryan White Youth Leadership Award (2017) from the National Bleeding Disorders Foundation and the Future Leaders Award from the Hemophilia Federation of America (2022). I feel these youth awards are a great way to bring visibility to the ways that young people can get involved in this community to drive change.

The Eastern PA Bleeding Disorders Foundation Scholarship will help me achieve my academic goals by providing very helpful financial support. My years of giving back to the bleeding disorders community will help me succeed in my pursuit of a Business Degree at Southern Methodist University because these experiences have given me the chance to develop my skills of leadership, project management, public speaking, an appreciation for the financial/insurance challenges of costly biologic medications and a deeper understanding of the legislative process.

She understood just about ninety percent of my current troubles.

Jessica never for one minute made me to feel uncomfortable in my present situation. However, it was just the opposite.

And as a man that has been independent since the age of sixteen, my ego took the reigns of my self pride. But even then, Jessica's humanitarianism of good deed seemed to steep further and further into the angel that I believe she is. She helped me with food, getting my utilities in order, as well as enlightening me with resources I never knew of. But allow me to incorporate a fact that there were just a few times that I thought she was becoming to be a bit pushy in her work. Notice I said work, not character. You see because from past experiences in my life, there were situations I endured that caused me to be afraid when folk start to be too much of a help. It's then I become to feel obligated. And trust me, I truly hate being obligated to anyone on this earth.

But Jessica kept coming on strong in which led me to believe that yes, this young lady is truly sincere in good character. I'm a bit of a spiritual soul, and most times I can spot a phoney. 


- 1. The applicant is a member of the Eastern Pennsylvania Bleeding Disorders Foundation with a diagnosed bleeding disorder.
